

# Call for nominations for open positions on First's Mission & Ministry Council

In preparation for the annual Voters' Assembly meeting, which will be held in June 2023, MMC President Jason Mercer has issued a call for nominations for officers and MMC at-large members to be elected at that meeting. The list of

nominees will be closed at the time the meeting agenda and slate of candidates is distributed prior to the meeting.

Nominations are now open for the office of Vice President (for a 1-year term); Secretary (for a 2-year term); Treasurer (for a 2-year term); and four

at-large members (two for a 1-year term, and two for a 2-year term). All terms will begin on July 1, 2023.

The office of Vice-President may be occupied only by a male voting member of the congregation (a voting member is a confirmed member, 18 year of age or older.) Basic duties of the Vice-President include presiding at all meetings of the MMC and/or the congregation when the President is absent, or when requested by the President to do so; initiating counsel with the President should a violation of policy occur; and leading the nominating committee for the election of officers and members of the MMC.

Basic duties of the Secretary include maintaining minutes of all MMC and congregational meetings and documentation of MMC decisions; ensuring that all such minutes are kept on file in the church for future reference;

conducting all official correspondence of the MMC and congregational meetings; and being familiar with the Constitution and Bylaws.

Basic duties of the Treasurer are overseeing the financial records of the church; suggesting solutions for financial decisions regarding the church budget;

preparing and presenting an annual church budget (spending plan) to be presented to the congregation at the annual voters' meeting; and being familiar with the Constitution and Bylaws.

Members of the MMC may not serve on other boards or committees of the church.

The MMC generally meets one evening each month, for approximately two hours.

Martin Luther explained that God hides in unexpected places so as not to be found where the world assumes a god would be — in power, status, fame, wealth — but to be found in weakness, humility and places of suffering.

"Those who have found God in the cross of Jesus Christ," said 20<sup>th</sup>-century theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer, "know

how wonderfully God hides Himself in this world and how He is closest precisely when we believe Him to be most distant." So God assures us of His presence in the humble manger, among the poor and outcast during His ministry, in the excruciating suffering of the cross, and with us in every struggle.

God hides not to avoid us but so we will discover Him precisely where we need Him most, and where others need us most.



# **Easter Crosses the River!**




"God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do: by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh," Romans 8:3.

Max Lucado, in his book, Six Hours One Friday, tells the story of a missionary in Brazil who discovered a tribe of Indians in a remote part of the jungle. They lived near a large river. The tribe needed medical attention. A contagious disease was ravaging the population. People were dying daily.

A hospital was not too terribly far away - across the river, but the Indians would not cross it because they believed it was inhabited by evil spirits. To enter the water would mean certain death. The missionary **explained** how he had crossed the river and was unharmed. They were not impressed. He then took them to the bank and **placed his hand** in the water. They still wouldn't go in. He walked into the water up to his waist and splashed water on his face. It didn't matter. They were still afraid to enter the river. Finally, he dove into the river, swam beneath the surface until he emerged on the other side. He punched a triumphant fist into the air. He had entered the water and escaped. It was then that the Indians broke out into a cheer and followed him across.

That's exactly what Easter is about! When Jesus dwelt on earth, He told the people of His day that they need not fear the river of death, but they wouldn't believe.

He touched a dead boy and called him back to life. They still didn't believe. He whispered life into the body of Jairus' dead daughter and got the same result. He let His dear friend, Lazarus, spend four days in a tomb and then called him out. The people still didn't believe Him. Finally, on the day we call Good Friday, He entered the river of death. Many watched but were unmoved. He was buried while others, including His disciples, feared death all the more. On Easter morning, He came out on the other side. Through His resurrection we have the "medicine" we desperately need for the contagious deadly disease of sin. When He rose from the river of death on the other side, like the Indians in Lucado's story, we break out into cheers yelling, "He is risen, risen indeed!"



The day will come when we follow Him across the river of death, and we will rise on the other side. As Paul wrote to the people of Corinth, we can say, "O death where is your sting, O grave where is your victory?"

On Easter Christ made the way for us to cross the river! Thanks be to God! Happy Easter, Church Family!

# Powers and duties of the Mission & Ministry Council

For those who wish to consider serving as an officer or at-large member of the MMC, following is a brief description of the way our governing body operates.

The MMC has the power to develop policies as required to execute the goals approved by the Voters' Assembly, and has no authority beyond that which has been conferred upon it by the Constitution, the Bylaws, and by the Voters' Assembly.

It is the chief governing body of the congregation, and acts in all matters pertaining to the legal and general welfare of the congregation, except those reserved for the Voters' Assembly (in Article V1.B. of the Constitution).

The MMC sees to it that all activities of the church reflect the purpose (Article II) and faith (Article III) of the congregation. It concerns itself with establishing all policies governing the activities of the congregation and with the implementation of the mission, vision, budget, goals and plans adopted by the Voters' Assembly.

The MMC may appoint any group or individual needed, and oversees and has authority over all other boards, committees, task forces, action teams, or other groups of individuals appointed by the MMC.




# Purchase of Easter cards benefits Cards 4 Kids ministry

Use batik, a unique fabric-dying method, to create flags celebrating the good news of Christ's resurrection.



- · Colored chalk
- · White linen fabric
- Washable gel glue · Acrylic craft paint
- Textile medium
- Paintbrushes

### What you do:

- 1. Cut fabric to the desired size and shape. Set it on a flat, protected surface. With chalk, lightly sketch an Easter design or message.
- 2. Completely cover the chalk lines with gel glue. Let dry.
- 3. Mix equal parts paint and textile medium. Paint the flag with that mixture, which makes paint permanent. Let dry.
- 4. Soak the dried fabric in warm water a few minutes. Then gently peel away the glue to reveal the unpainted areas. Lay flat to dry.
- 5. Hang the flags and celebrate!

**Kyson:** "Jesus is the Dad of us! He likes us!"


Sierra: "Jesus died on the cross for us. He healed Himself."

# Gifts for the generations to come - from your Board of Stewardship

"The Lord bless you from Zion! May you see the prosperity of Jerusalem all the days of your life! May you see your children's children! Peace be upon Israel!" (Psalm 128:5-6)



Stewardship is a generational thing. Without fail, those who grasp and practice the depth and joy of faithful stewardship have almost always learned it, not from a book or seminar, but from the faithful

example of those who paved the way before them. In many churches, the visible generosity of the sanctuary is a clear example.
