

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The First Word—June 2023

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There is nothing like driving down along on a smooth country road on a beautiful summer day. With the windows down, the wind blowing in your face, clearing your mind and

just soaking in the sun and God's creation, you could drive for a while.

And then BAM!!!! You're jarred from the dream of smooth country roads by a massive pothole! You continue to drive along, praying the tire sensor light on your dash doesn't come on, and BAM!!! Another pothole! Paying more attention now, you might

realize that in order to miss all the potholes, you'd have to swerve back and forth, from side to side.



Isn't this how life feels sometimes? You're going along and BAM!!!! A heart attack,

cancer, a stroke, a broken bone. You're going along and BAM!!! A close friend or family member dies. You're going along and BAM!!! A car accident. You're going along and BAM!!! The roof needs replacing, siding has been blown off your house, a tree falls over and hits a building. BAM!!! BAM!!! BAM!!!

I envision Moses and Joshua feeling this

way as they led the Israelites in the wilderness and around the Promised Land. God freed the Israelites from the Egyptians through the Red Sea and BAM!!! The Israelites are soon complaining and grumbling to God about how life was so much better for them in Egypt because they had food to eat. God provided manna and quail and things were good for a while. And then BAM!!! More grumbling, more complaining, more whining about how pitiful things were for them.




It's no wonder Joshua had some anxiety in being the next leader of the Israelites after Moses died. Not only was he in charge of leading millions of people into the Promised Land, he also knew how the people were, how they didn't always listen and trust in God's Word and command.

Pothole after pothole after pothole, Moses got frustrated with the Israelites and didn't follow God's command, and so he was not able to enter into the Promised Land. Pothole after pothole after pothole, Joshua was just as frustrated with the people and their lack of trust and dedication to God. Toward the end of his life, in Joshua 24, he basically tells them, "*Listen! You've got two choices: You can follow the gods of your forefathers which they worshiped while back in Egypt or ... you can serve God. It's up to you, but for me and my household, we will serve the LORD*" (Joshua 24:14-15 - paraphrased).

Joshua is told three times before Moses dies and three times before he leads the Israelites into the Promised Land to "**be strong and courageous**". This journey for Joshua was not going to be easy.

Our Christian life isn't always easy either. The writer of Psalm 55 says, **Cast your burden on the Lord, and he will sustain you; he will never permit the righteous to be moved** (55:22). Peter says **cast all your anxieties on him, because he cares for you** (1 Peter 5:7). Paul says, **Bear one another's burdens** (Galatians 6:2). Matthew records Jesus saying, "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light" (11:28-30).



The road to paradise with Christ can be rough, have hills and curves, isn't easy, and have potholes. But as we travel this road, we have One who walks along with us. With the

Holy Spirit living and dwelling in the hearts of Christians, Christ walks along with us on this road and leads and guides us to a time and place where the streets will be smooth. In the new creation to come when Christ returns, John writes in Revelation 21 that **the street of the city was pure gold, like transparent glass** (21:21).

As we live and move and have our being in Christ, **let's remember we are not alone,** for God goes with us! Let's rejoice in knowing that we can call on Him at any time along our life journey. With our living Savior with us, there is no need to be



anxious about when we hit the next pothole, for He will help us through, all the way to eternity!

Don't use summer as an excuse to skip church! By gathering in corporate worship, we obey God's command, become equipped for Christian living, and minister to our fellow pilgrims. Consider these tips for engaging in corporate worship.

First, show up — in person if you can. Examine your heart and your motivation for attending church. Lift up your eyes from earthly matters to focus on God.

Come prepared. Do you need to confess anything or remove any hindrance? As you worship, consider how each part of the service displays the gospel: greeting, singing, confessing, reading Scripture, hearing Bible-based teaching, praying, giving and communing.

Be careful not to compartmentalize corporate worship as separate from the rest of life. Instead, consider how you'll carry the experience into the coming week. Come ready to receive; then let that overflow fuel you for the days ahead. Come prepared to participate, knowing that worshiping together is a rehearsal for heaven. But most importantly? Just come.

Dual citizenship

For Christianity and democracy to work, both need responsible citizens. Consider what happens to a republic when its citizens won't run for public office, won't vote, won't work for the common good, duck paying taxes and mistreat others. Now consider what happens when Christians won't volunteer at the church, won't give, won't practice their faith, won't love their neighbors. Both our country and our faith need sincere practitioners. Nationally, we need a citizenry committed to making the ideals of liberty the practices of life in America. Christianity needs followers of Jesus committed to making the ideals of God's kingdom the practices of daily life.

This is not an either-or situation. Christians everywhere are citizens of two countries, one on earth and one in eternity. The kingdom of God is not yet fully come, but it's already in effect. Our two citizenships can neither be fully united nor fully separated. We cannot withdraw from the world and pretend we are somehow dwelling only in the kingdom of God now; nor can we simply embrace the world and assume earthly governments fulfill God's will. Those are extremes, and they are unbiblical.

No greater gift than love


"But earnestly desire the higher gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way" (1 Corinthians 12:31).

Higher gifts. More excellent way. These sound like comparatives. They are, if you are talking about us. But these words that the Holy Spirit gives to Paul are not about us. They are only and always about what He desires us to have!

The Lord wants you to know that your simple gifts are in no way simplistic. They are glory! But not your glory. They are His glory. If you read the entire chapter of 1 Corinthians 12, you see some fantastic gifts being called lower gifts. Healing. Tongues. Interpretation. These are all fantastic if you were to have them. It is hard to see gift of love. Jesus says so! any way in which these are lesser gifts.

That is until you read what the Lord desires as a higher gift. 1 Corinthians 13 talks about it. The higher gift is love! There is no greater gift than love. Jesus talks about that in John 15:13 when He says that "greater love has no

one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friend." This is the kind of love that we have been given. God loved the world so much that He gave us Jesus. Jesus loved us so much that He died and rose. These is no greater



And this greater love that God has given us in Jesus is an active love! It is given so that we can give it away. That is what our stewardship is all about. Giving freely of the greater love that we have been given!

indeed lesser gifts. It doesn't mean that they aren't important or valuable. But they are lesser if they are not connected to love. The love they are connected to by the Holy Spirit is a love that comes from the Lord, through us, to others. We become a conduit of love that flows out to those who need it. This involves service. This involves activity. It also involves financial resources. When taken together, packaged in love, these simple gifts do amazing things! Let's see together what the Lord will do with these simple gifts!

Blessed Lord, we give You but Your own in all these gifts we bring to You this day and throughout the year. Fill our heart with a love of the Lord, a love of the Gospel and a love for our neighbors that will lead us to give of all of ourselves so that they may know the extravagant, radical love of God that comes in Jesus Christ!
