



#### It's Church Worker Appreciation Month

"I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the Gospel from the first day until now, being confident of this, that He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus" (Philippians 1:3-6).

As St. Paul wrote in his letter to the Philippians, with this same gratitude we thank the more than 11,000 church workers who are "Set Apart to Serve" our Synod with the Word and mercy of Christ. We give thanks for pastors and teachers who teach God's Word to our children and adults, dedicate countless

hours to the classroom, who love the children of God they teach, and who live a life of service to Christ and His church.

This month, let Pastor Miller and our teachers in Midweek/Confirmation Classes, Sunday School, Bible studies, and First Lutheran School know how much you appreciate their service to our Lord and First Lutheran congregation.

Several ideas are included on Page 2, and you may have other unique ways of recognizing these leaders in our church.

#### OWLS learn first-hand about advocating for the unborn, feeding the hungry in our area

A small contingent of Older, Wiser, Loving Saints (OWLS) ventured out in the rain on September 21 to tour Options Clinic and Helena Food Share, both of which our church supports as missions.

At Options, Community Relations
Coordinator Jenny Genger explained the
history of the organization and presented
an overview of the services provided,
including pregnancy testing, ultrasound,
decision making tools, prenatal and
parenting classes, STD testing and
treatment, STD education, life skills
classes, post-abortion help, adoption
referrals, baby and maternity supplies,
and community resources. Options also
offers Youth Nights to equip our youth
with the truth about pregnancy and
STDs, and to encourage them to
choose abstinence.

Nurse Manager Tina Wooley showed an ultrasound image of a nine-week-old baby, with head, hands, and feet already forming, and the baby's heart beating. What an amazing little life!

Options is a non-profit, accredited medical clinic empowering women and men to make healthy decisions regarding their sexual health, pregnancy, and parenting in a non-judgmental and caring environment.

At Helena Food Share, Development Manager Maddie Balachowski guided the group through the facility, while many volunteers bustled about stocking shelves, refrigerators, and freezers.

Maddie explained that one in seven of our neighbors is hungry, one in five children don't have enough to eat, and one in five senior citizens wonder when their next meal might be.

Customers can shop weekly for items. There are no age or income restrictions, though customers must complete an initial registration form. The amount of food they receive is based on the number of people in their household. Limits for various food items in the pantry are listed each day and are based on availability.

When school is in session, Food Share also provides Kid Packs for children who are in need of nutritious food over the weekend days.

Volunteers help guide customers through the check-in and shopping process, rescue food from local stores, sort and move food each day so the Pantry is stocked and ready to go, and build boxes and bags of food for programs such as Kid Packs and Emergency Food Packs.

Time to spare? Consider volunteering with one of these fine organizations!

#### God is worthy of my trust

Missionary and author Elisabeth Elliot says our sovereign God is worthy of unquestioning obedience in matters both large and small. Such trust yields mighty results, she adds, providing Christians with rest, peace and guidance.

"God is God," says Elliot. "Because He is God, He is worthy of my trust and obedience. I will find rest nowhere but in His holy will that is unspeakably beyond my largest notions of what He is up to."

About the role of obedience in prayer, Elliot asks, "Does it make sense to pray for guidance about the future if we are not obeying in the thing that lies before us today? How many momentous events in Scripture depended on one person's seemingly small act of obedience! Rest assured: Do what God tells you to do now, and, depend upon it, you will be shown what to do next."

#### Ideas for honoring ministry leaders

Even though our spiritual leaders don't look for applause, those of us blessed by their leadership know how much they deserve to be honored. Take a moment to consider what makes these leaders special to you, and how you might express that during this month. Here are three simple but powerful ideas:


- Begin an appreciation list and keep it with you for several days, jotting notes as thoughts come to you. When your list is complete, sit down and write a personal note of thanks. Then, encourage other church members to do the same thing.
- Take a blank sheet of paper to the next meeting or class you attend at church. At the top, add a title like "We Love (name of church worker) Because." Pass the paper from person to person around the table,

giving each individual an opportunity to complete the sentence in one or more ways. You might consider doing this with two or more groups over several weeks. Mail the notes to the individual at home. You don't need impressive words or a creative writing course to make these ideas work. All you need is a love for Jesus and a heart filled with thanks to Him for sending these special people to you. Write from your heart!

• Put together a self-care basket. Include items like yummy treats, bath bombs, essential oils, a gift card to a local spa, a new mug and nice tea, a calming candle, or other items to give the gift of rest and peace to those in leadership positions in the church.



My Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

When you have good news to share, how do you get the message out? Take out an ad in a newspaper? Paint a sign? Put up a billboard? Place it on social media? Send out a text message or email?

When Martin Luther had Good News of God's grace to share, he nailed it to a billboard! Think of it, the Protestant Reformation, which rocked Christianity and changed the world, started with a bulletin board!

People of Luther's time gathered around the church. The church stood in the center of town as the most important building. A person with a special announcement naturally went to the church. The doors of the church soon became a kind of bulletin board. People would use the doors and nail on them all kinds of announcements.

Martin Luther wanted to nail up a message. He had written 95 short thoughts, or theses, about the Christian faith and the errors of the church of his day. Because he wanted lots of people to see these theses, he nailed them to the town bulletin board — the church doors. Soon people read his statements and became excited. God's Word and His

Church were about Jesus, the Savior. This was a change from what the people of Luther's day were hearing — a Reformation!

God still provides "bulletin boards" today. Perhaps they're not church doors, but God does give ways to show others what is most important to people, and to you! Do your friends and family members, the people at your school or work know that you believe in and love Jesus?

What is most important to you? What do you have on your bulletin board?

Martin Luther started the Reformation by telling others about Jesus and His love for all people. That same Jesus loves and cares for you and for all today!

Why not write about that Reformation Good News on your webpage, or

Facebook page, or on X or Instagram, or AI, or bulletin board? Like Martin Luther, you might just "nail it" for someone you know and love!

You've got Good News about Jesus to share! I do too!



#### It's all in the way you use it!

#### from your Board of Stewardship



Consider the humble baseball bat. It is a simple tool designed for a complex task. The batter needs a tool that can consistently deliver force to a small ball which may be thrown at over 100 miles per hour, but which

might also come slanting across the plate as a slow curve. For a game like this, the founders of baseball had to redesign the old cricket bat, which is more of a flat paddle. The tool had to fit the job.

But even a specially-designed tool can be used for a different purpose. It turns out that some years ago in England, the home of cricket, baseball bats suddenly started selling like hotcakes. What were folks across the pond doing with all those baseball bats? Using them as clubs in riots!

A tool can be used, and it can be misused. It's all in the way that you use it.

The same is true with the things of God. The Second Commandment states that we should "not misuse the name of the Lord." In the Small Catechism, Luther goes on to tell us exactly what this misuse is, as well as the proper use:

"We should fear and love God so that we do not curse, swear, use satanic arts, lie, or deceive by His name, but call upon it in every trouble, pray, praise, and give thanks." (SC I)

The Lord has given us His name: He has placed it upon us in Holy Baptism and He has invited us to pray to Him as our Father. In this sense, the Lord's

name is something for us to use. We should not misuse it ... and we should not fail to use it. The Pharisees of old were so afraid of misusing the name of God that they decided to simply never say the name of God (YAHWEH Jehovah) at all! This non-use is just as bad as misuse. The Lord gives His gifts for our use.

A Christian steward is one who is called to use all of God's gifts for His purposes. This includes things like the Name of God, the Sacraments and the Word, and it also includes things like our family and friends, our talents and skills, our money and resources. Everything that God has given to you, He has given to you so that you may be blessed to use it for His kingdom.

#### What is lament?

The spiritual discipline of lament may not come naturally, and churches rarely teach it. Because we're raised to stay silent if we can't say something nice, passionately pouring out our sorrow just doesn't seem right.

My opinion changed when I heard author Sharon Garlough Brown explain this spiritual practice from God's perspective. As parents can attest, toddlers have an innate ability to find foreign objects and put them in their mouths. Concerned parents bend down and coax the child to remove the toy, bottle top, coin or rock. "Spit it out." "Let me have it." "It's not good for you to swallow that."

As a concerned parent, God sees and knows what's troubling us. He knows that this world's woes and trials will hurt us if we keep them all inside. God, our good and gracious Father, wants us to passionately pour out our grief, so he bends down, looks us in the eyes, and says, "Spit it out." "Let me have it." "It's not good for you to swallow that."

Spend time with God, sharing your laments. God loves you and is faithful to listen well.

# **MISSIONARY-**

An important part of missions is prayerfully supporting the church. Use this activity to guide your family's prayer time.

#### What you need:

- Plastic bag (large zippered)
- Permanent marker
- Bandage
- Toy plane
- Heart-shaped drawing or toy
- Spoon
- Coin
- Hot-sauce packet

#### What you do:

- 1. Label the bag with details about the missionaries you'll be praying for (names, location, specific needs).
- 2. Add small prayer-prompt objects to guide your prayer time (bandage = health, plane = travel, heart = relationships, spoon = cultural connection, coin = finances, hot sauce = boldness).
- 3. Include other objects that will prompt prayer for missionaries' specific needs.
- 4. Place the bag where it will remind your family to pray regularly.




## Looking for a fun way to help our youth group?


