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Voters handle full business slate in record time at annual voters' meeting

Thirty-three eligible voting members signed the voter registration sheet for this meeting, and after enjoying a light lunch, and an opening prayer offered by Pastor Larry Miller, approved the minutes of the June 11, 2023, voters' meeting, which had also been approved by the MMC at its June 20, 2023, meeting, and posted to the bulletin board in Ziegler Hall, for perusal by interested members.

Voters also approved the proposed spending plan for the 2024-2025 fiscal year, which began on July 1, 2024. This spending plan, as presented, estimates a total income of \$504,620, with estimated total expenses of \$504,374, for an

estimated net income of \$246.

President Jason Mercer was re-elected to serve a 2-year term, and David Goodson, Steven Johnson, Randy Middlebrook, and Elly Schmeltzer were elected to serve 2-year terms as MMC at-large members. All terms began on July 1, 2024.

Marty Baumann, Aaron Hollatz, Bill Spellman, Paul Taylor, and Walter Wareham were elected to serve 2-year terms on the Board of Elders. Mr. Spellman's term will not begin until August 1, 2024, because he will be a member of FLC for one year on that date.

President Mercer distributed a copy of the Strategic Plan for FLCS, explaining that no action was required of the voters; he simply wanted to review what has been done thus far. Taking input from members, the MMC put together the Strategic Plan with five areas to be addressed: Worship, Nurture, Fellowship, Outreach, and Stewardship, and developed objectives to be accomplished over a five-year period. We have, he explained, been working on objectives for 2023-2024, and we'll do an update for 2024-2025.

On the accomplishments side, under Increasing Fellowship Opportunities for Members and Visitors, we have reestablished the Fellowship Committee under the leadership of Janice Larison.

In the *Împrove Our Digital Footprint Through Our Website and Social*

Media area, there is more interest now in online giving and we want to encourage that as a norm for us and regular visitors.

Under the *Develop a Plan for* Called Staff area, we called Sue Taylor as our Director of Education.

In "going forward" planning, under the *Increase Fellowship* Opportunities section, Plan a 2024 summer/fall retreat for families, he explained that it is hard to say whether this will be accomplished this fall or in the future. He know there are people considering putting this together and leading it. The MMC is talking about this and trying to provide leadership, but we need volunteers to step up to make it work.

The Expand Our Outreach Opportunities item is for outreach to the community outside of the church; things like helping someone with lawn care, leaves, or other physical chores. Perhaps we can put up some type of display board where members can post their needs, and volunteers can select a need and accomplish it.

Under the *Improve Our Digital Footprint* area, we are looking to update the church's website because we need to make it easier for people to navigate the site, and perhaps offer some added items like updated photos. We need to make sure information on the site is current. Without an updated and interesting website, people visiting the site may wonder if our church is really doing anything.

We will continue to look at the *Develop a Plan for Called Staff* area.

President Mercer is hoping we can accomplish these "going forward" goals in the first year of his second term as president, especially developing opportunities for people to get "plugged in" with the church, and using The *First* Word newsletter to bring awareness to those opportunities.



Can you hear the choir singing? We are starting up Chancel Choir beginning in September after summer break. What does this mean? It means that beginning **September 11**, we will meet on Wednesdays following our church services (about 7:15 p.m.) and sing for our church services during the months of September through May. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind... (Romans 12:2)

Our culture almost universally hates conformity. I should be able to decide who I am, what I look like, and what I do. This is one of the few ideas that crosses all political, economic, and social lines. Sure, it might be framed in different ways ("freedom", "rights", "autonomy", "self-determination", and

so forth), but it's all the same in the end.

There's an irony here, though, isn't there? With all the talk about our individual choices and desires, **cultures still have norms and mores to which the majority expects everyone to conform.** If an individual or group doesn't conform to these, they are ignored at best, usually shunned, and sometimes persecuted. Some of these values have become so strongly held that one wrong word, idea, paper, post, or tweet can get a person in hot water quickly – and permanently.

The truth is that, despite periods of relative peace and respite, **the**Church has always been different than the world. In fact, our Lord reminds us that we are not of the world, but that He chose us out of the world (John 15:19). On the one hand, we are *in* the world as we go about our daily business interacting with others. On the other hand, we are not of the world, in that our lives should look different than those of people in and of the world.





According to Jesus, this means that we live lives of faith, trusting in God and not in money or other people. It means not seeking after what the world seeks: the vain pleasures that are here today and gone tomorrow. Practically, it can look so different, but, the truth is, our *whole* lives should often look different from others' in the world. We have been transformed by Christ!

Jesus came to live, to die, and to rise again ... so that we will have new life!


Why would we want to live like those in the world? We shouldn't! As hard as it is sometimes, our lives will look different in every way: We'll be in church while others are traveling for games; We'll spend our money helping others instead of storing up for ourselves; We'll treat marriage and children as gifts from God instead of profaning them; We'll teach our children what is good and godly instead of "letting them decide" (as if that were possible in the first place); We'll proclaim Christ's death and resurrection at funerals (with readings, the message, and music) instead of touting a person's achievements or simply holding a party instead; and, we'll forgive, pray for, and love even our enemies instead of holding a grudge or seeking revenge. Why? Because we have been transformed to be like our Lord Jesus Christ, who perfectly did all of this and more for us. All in all, we'll continue to discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect (Romans 12:2).

How? Of course, always, and only by the Word of God!

Mercy and grace lead to generosity

"Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift" (2 Cor. 9:15)! This is St. Paul's exclamation upon hearing the Corinthian church's response to the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and his request for support for the church in Jerusalem. The Christians in Corinth heard and received God's mercy in Christ, and they responded to St. Paul's call to support Christians in Jerusalem with a collection. The Corinthians' joy filled Jerusalem's need.

This is the reality of stewardship. Because of God's generosity in the giving of His Son to die on the cross for us, we are to be generous with all that we receive from Him. What do we receive? Everything. All that we are and all that we have is the Lord's. He is the creator and the giver. We are His creatures and those who receive what He gives.

It sounds easy. And it is. But then again it isn't. Stewardship is easy because it is God's work. Through what God gives, we give to others. Through what God gives, we support the work of the church for the life of the world. He gives; we receive. And

like our generous Father in Heaven, we, as His children, use what He gives to us to love and serve others.



But stewardship is also difficult. That is because it goes against our natural inclination to think that what I have is mine to do what I want with. This is our sinful nature. It is our selfishness and our greed. How can we who have been given everything life, food, clothing, house, home, forgiveness, divine sonship, an eternal inheritance — be so stingy with what we give to the church, the place where we hear about and receive all that God gives us and does for us? We are all

guilty of this kind of thinking. And the only godly response is to repent and trust in the Gospel.

For if God has given you His own Son, will He not give you all things? Yes. He will. This is His sure and certain promise. God provides for His people. He provides everything we need for this body and life and for the life that is to come.

The church is a mercy place. It's a place where God's mercy in the death and resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ, is given and received. For us who believe it means forgiveness, life and salvation in the face of sin, death and the power of the devil. Here in the church, we inhale God's mercy in Word and Sacrament, and exhale this same mercy in love and service to our neighbor. And that is an enduring, joyful thing to do. Our joy fills our neighbor's need because His joy filled ours (Heb. 12:2). Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift!

- 1 cup baby oil




What you do:


