# Call for nominations for open positions on First's Mission & Ministry Council

In preparation for the annual Voters' Assembly meeting, which will be held in June 2025, MMC President Jason Mercer has issued a call for nominations for officers and MMC at-large members to be elected at that meeting. The list of

nominees will be closed at the time the meeting agenda and slate of candidates is published prior to the June meeting.

Nominations are now open for the office of Vice
President (for a 1-year term);
Secretary (for a 2-year term);
Treasurer (for a 2-year term); and two

MMC at-large members (each for 2-year terms). All terms will begin on July 1, 2025.

The office of Vice President may be occupied only by a male voting member of the congregation (a voting member is a confirmed member, 18 years of age or older). Basic duties of the Vice President include presiding at all meetings of the MMC and/or the congregation when the President is absent, or when requested by the President to do so; initiating counsel with the President should a violation of

policy occur; and leading the nominating committee for the election of officers and members of the MMC.

Basic duties of the Treasurer are overseeing the financial records of the church; suggesting solutions for

financial decisions regarding the church budget; preparing and presenting an annual church budget (spending plan) to be presented to the congregation at the annual voters' meeting; and being familiar with the Constitution and Bylaws.

# Celebrating 95 years of a life well-lived



## Pastor's Page... About Lent, Holy Week, and Easter!

It is no secret that **Jesus sent His first disciples out in teams** – two - by - two. I've often wondered who got to go with whom, but we're not told. As Jesus called the disciples in the first place, He likely decided who their traveling companions would be as well.

We still serve in teams in the church today. We depend on others for prayer and encouragement. In many of our servant ministries we work with people, side by side. Echoing through the church for all these centuries is the truth from Ecclesiastes 4:9, "Two are better than one."

There is a time, though, when one might be better than two. Jesus shows us that Himself, when all along His way to the cross, all through those three years of ministry, He took off alone for solitude and prayer. Check it out in Matthew 14:13, Mark 1:35, or Luke 4:42. When Jesus had a big decision to make (like choosing His disciples), when He needed special strength for a giant challenge (like His trial and Passion), or when He was just plain exhausted, Jesus got away, I mean away from everybody, and went it alone. Truth is, He wasn't alone - alone; He was alone with His Father.

**Jesus even had a special place for prayer.** When He was in Jerusalem He returned again and again to a lovely garden on the Mount of Olives, called Gethsemane. It reminds me of a verse from Alexander Pope's famous poem, "Ode on Solitude":

How happy he, who free from care, The rage of courts, and noise of towns; Contented breathes his native air, In his own grounds.

I've never been to the Garden of Gethsemane. I can imagine, though, spending some time alone there praying and reading the Passion history of our Savior and growing.

The truth is, **you and I need solitude.** If Jesus needed it, how much more we! Maybe, as we journey through Lent and enter Holy Week, it's time for us to take a quiet walk and pray a prayer through our familiar territory.

Maybe it's a favorite chair or a quiet place where you can **open your Bible and really hear God speak to you in particular, to you with your needs, your weaknesses, your challenges.** It may even be a whole day dedicated to a silent retreat in God's presence. However you do it, you and God need to be alone together.

We live a crowded life, we disciples. We live and work and worship in masses of people. We work well in teams, but **we also need to be alone with God.** He clears the head and cleans the heart. He opens our eyes and strengthens our weak knees for the road that lies ahead.

After Jesus left the solitude of Gethsemane, He journeyed to the Cross and to the Open Tomb and eventually to His home in heaven! As we journey with Him this Lent and Easter, may we also experience His amazing grace and love ... for us!

# Book may help to cope in difficult times

A recent acquisition to the church library is *My Two* Elaines, in which Martin J. Schreiber relates his walk with his wife through the various stages of Alzheimer's. The subtitle, *Learning, Coping, and Surviving as an Alzheimer Caregiver,* aptly describes the book.

Elaine was Schreiber's gracious first lady when he was governor of Wisconsin. The second Elaine is the person she became as the disease claimed her senses. Pages from her journals show her initial frustration at the diagnosis and her later perceptions of events in her life.

The author comments on situations he encountered and offers advice to others who may be journeying through life as a caregiver to his or her spouse. Because Alzheimer's disease touches many lives, learning how one caregiver coped may provide hope to others.

The book is shelved in the S section of the nonfiction books.

## Blessed shall you be

#### — from your Board of Stewardship

"Blessed shall you be in the city, and blessed shall you be in the field. Blessed shall be the fruit of your womb and the fruit of your ground and the fruit of your cattle, the increase of your herds and the young of your flock. Blessed shall be your basket and your kneading bowl. Blessed shall you be when you come in, and blessed shall you be when you go out" (Deuteronomy 28:3-6).

This is God's promise to the Israelites as they stood beyond the Jordan outside of the Promised Land. He promises blessing to His people. He will make them prosper, whether they are in the city or the field. He will make the fruit of their work to prosper, whether from the ground, their wombs, their flocks, or their herds. He will make them to prosper in all things, whether upon their coming in or their going out.

But there's a catch. He would do this

for Israel only "if you obey the voice of the LORD your God" (Deut. 28:2b). If they did that, He would cause that "all these blessings shall come upon you and overtake you" (Deut. 28:2a). If they didn't obey the voice of the Lord, if they didn't keep the commandments of the Lord and "walk in his ways" (Deut. 28:9), they would be met with curse and woe. The blessings would be replaced with curses. Everything that the Lord promised to prosper and bless would be cursed and fail.

Thanks be to God that our Lord Jesus Christ has come into our flesh and fulfilled the law for us – in our place and for our benefit. Our Lord Jesus Christ died for us – in our place and for our benefit. Our Lord Jesus Christ is risen from the dead for us – in our place and for our benefit. By this we have justification before God. We are forgiven, clean, holy, and

righteous. The blessing of God is promised to us in Christ Jesus. It depends upon His work, not ours.

All this is ours in Holy Baptism. For in Holy Baptism, God claims us as His own, makes us His children, His heirs, and His holy people. And so it is that the work of our hands and its fruit is holy because we are holy in Christ. It is pressed into His service, and it thereby becomes a blessing to us and to our neighbor.

For this great gift, our reception of the blessings of God because of Christ Jesus our Lord, it is our duty to thank and praise, serve, and obey Him. This is not in order to receive the blessings but because in Christ we already have. With this in mind, we sit down on the first day of the week and set aside as He has prospered us to give to His church for His work of blessing in our midst (1 Cor. 16:2).


