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Full agenda for Annual Voters' Assembly meeting on Sunday, June 8



Please mark your calendar and plan now to attend the Annual Voters' meeting set to convene at 1 p.m. on Sunday,

June 8. A light lunch will be served prior to the convening of the meeting.

Agenda items include the presentation of the proposed Spending Plan for Fiscal Year 2025-2026, the election of MMC members, and election of members of the Board of Elders.

The nominees for MMC positions are: Secretary (2-year term) - Linda Fromm; Treasurer (2-year term) - John Champagne; MMC at-large members (both for 2-year terms) - Roger Schultz and Seth Siefken.

President Jason Mercer has one year

remaining on his second 2-year term. There are no nominees for the position of Vice President, so that position will remain unfilled.

MMC at-large members David Goodson, Steven Johnson, and Randy Middlebrook have one year remaining on their 2-year terms.

The nominees for the Board of Elders (all 2-year terms) are: Brian Buhr, Allen Keim, and Rick Northrup.

Per Article 9 of the Bylaws, the list of nominees is closed at the time the meeting agenda and slate of candidates is distributed (which was done in the Sunday Announcements beginning on Sunday, May 25, and also by way of this article). No nominations will be accepted from the floor during the meeting.

Voting members are all confirmed members who have reached the age of 18.

Amazing way the deaf "hear"

On May 22, First's OWLS were treated to a presentation on a subject not normally explored: sign language to the deaf.

First's own Janice Larison, whose brother was born deaf, taught deaf children for 18 years. She earned her bachelor's degree in elementary education, and at that time decided to go on to become a teacher of the deaf. She was employed by the Los Angeles Office of Education teaching young deaf children, who normally came to her at age three, but a few as young as 18 months. Those children stayed with her until about age eight.

In her early years, the style was not to teach sign language, but to teach deaf people to speak. At that time, her sign language training was to sign "exact English," which meant she would sign using English grammatically structured sentences completely, using past tenses and plurals, etc. Because deaf people would eventually have to read and write English, it was deemed best to teach them sign language using an English grammatical structure. She did not learn ASL (American Sign



Language) until later in her career. ASL uses signs for various words and phrases.

Janice provided a packet of information comparing how a simple sentence written in English would be signed, and also included signs for religious entities, among them: Jesus, Lord, priest (minister/pastor), pray, soul, and worship. In addition, the information included an illustration of how to form every individual letter of the alphabet. The alphabet is used mainly if there is no sign for an object

MAELYNN: Visit my cousins in Missoula.



Janice offered several tips about communicating with deaf or hearing-impaired people, especially to look directly at them and not to raise your voice. They are going to lip read to some degree, and your voice is stronger if it is coming from straight on.

Many deaf children are born of deaf parents, but that is probably best because they are all communicating from day one. Pastor Miller provided information on the Lutheran Deaf Mission Society, which has been active since 1894, and whose vision is to partner with LCMS Districts and congregations to give them the training, tools, and other resources they need to bring God's Word to the deaf. Spiritually, more than 95% of the deaf in the U. S. are without Christ.

To make the OWLS' day even more special, Get Set and PreK students from our school signed the entire *Jesus Loves Me* hymn without uttering a sound!

I came across this wonderful passage, titled "the eye of a needle" (again) the other day (Mark 10:24-27). I love what it has to say to you and me and us all!

The disciples were amazed at his words. But Jesus said to them again, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kingdom of God! It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God." The disciples were even more astonished. They said to each other, "Then who can be saved?" Jesus looked at them and said, "With man this is impossible, but not with God. All things are possible with God."

It's a passage that has been misunderstood over the centuries. The best way to understand it is to read it all the way to verse 27 and let Jesus and the

disciples show how they understood what he meant. Jesus uses two key words: hard and impossible. He says that it is hard to enter the kingdom of God. Very hard! It's



so hard, it would be like a very large animal, the camel, to go through a very small opening, like the eye of a sewing needle. That's impossible!

This sank in with the disciples. Their amazement turned into something deeper. They were struck by his words. They worked it out in their heads, and



finally they began saying to one another, "Then who can be saved?" There was a standard that no man could live up to. It's still there today. What appears difficult at first, like a child's puzzle, hits us hard: This applies to me. I can't do it. I can't possibly succeed

because of my sinful condition, because I keep on sinning. "Then who can be saved?"

Here is where God shows his love. **What's impossible for man is not impossible for God.** This is the God who made the sun go back ten steps for King Hezekiah (Isaiah 38:8), who made the sun stop for a whole day after the hailstorm at Gibeon (Joshua 10:12-13), and who made the sun in the first place (Genesis 1:16).

The image of the camel isn't supposed to make us think of a big animal unpacking its load and crawling through a low doorway on its knees as if in repentance. Nor is the image of the camel supposed to make



us think of a ship's anchor cable (rather than a camel) passing through a tiny opening. Jesus wants me to picture an animal as tall as I am that weighs half a ton walking through the tiny hole at the end of a sewing needle. **Jesus**

wants me to understand how only God can accomplish our salvation.

Later in this chapter Jesus will provide the theme for this whole Second Gospel: "*The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many*" (Mark 10:45). This is how God does the impossible for us. He

supplies us with faith in Jesus Christ, who covered our errors and who supplies everything we don't have that God demands.

The salvation of the sinner is founded on the merciful love of God. In this love, God wants the salvation

of fallen humanity. "Do I take any pleasure in the death of the wicked? declares the Lord



of Armies. Rather, am I not pleased when they turn from their ways and live?" (Ezekiel 18:23).

In His love, God is moved to bring about our deliverance and to offer the means through which the lost can receive this

deliverance. These are the means of grace, the Gospel in Word and Sacrament. The Gospel is the medicine for our sickly and dying souls, and the means of grace bring this Gospel medicine to us through faith in Christ. The medicine is offered to everyone, but those who reject it, or are blocked from receiving it, do not receive its benefits. The




medicine contains the key ingredient: Christ's blood shed on the cross for our sins. This is only possible through God's gracious love. With God, everything is possible. Nothing is

impossible, not even that God would forgive a sinner like you and me!

Next time you see a needle, or a camel, or something impossible **thank God for His impossible forgiveness, salvation. and love!**

In addition to the Wednesday morning crew, we have women who cut squares, sew quilt tops and drawstring school bags, hem the quilts, and weight boxes after they are packed for shipping.

The quilts and school kits were blessed on May 4, packed on May 7, and pickup up on May 9. We sent 43 quilts and 25 school kits to Lutheran World Relief. During the year, we also donated four quilts to individuals in need.



We celebrate Independence Day in July because of the freedoms and We are right to

do this. We should be thankful for these liberties - the freedom to gather together to worship and to live out what we believe in our daily lives.
